Clack Family Heritage Museum

Located in R. M. Oakview



Located on the Clack farm 10 km (6.5 mi) northwest of Rivers

Take Provincial Road #250 north from Rivers for 2 mi, turn west for 4 mi, and north 1 mile. 3 mi east of Oak River on hyw 24, 3 mi south, 1 mi east & 1 1/2 mile south

and collecting. Each had
his own particular interests, whether it was tobacco cans, license plates,
farm equipment or vintage vehicles.

The Museum's huge collection of pioneer artifacts and incredible beautiful and valuable antiques is housed in a series of specialized theme buildings. The Clack Brothers' "dream of a Lifetime" features everything from a Victorian era home, price-



less lamps, glassware and porcelain china to an array of children's playthings, a Halfway House complete with gaming table and barber chair, plus an Early Railroad display, detailed models of farm machinery hand-made by the Clacks during long Manitoba winters, and a complete miniature layout of a country fair depicting the time of 1902 to 2002.

In 1996 Tim Clack gave the Museum over to the Clack Family Heritage Museum Foundation Inc. A volunteer Board helps maintain the operation of the Museum so that it will always serve as a centre for the preservation of historical artifacts and Canadian culture.



One of the large steel buildings on the Museum site houses an array of vintage cars and trucks.

These were the particular interest of the youngest brother, Fred.

Probably the favorite of the old vehicles, and the one most often in demand to be driven for show in rural parades, is a shiny red "Chev 490" from 1924. It could have been purchased new at that time for \$490 but now it is a priceless treasure.





A touring Model T Ford, a shiny blue 1926 Essex Super Six, a lovely green 1931 Chev show car and a beautifully restored Model T Ford truck, are other popular vehicles.
